I would like to high light some of our activities of the year from 1st April 2017 to 31st March 2018.

We are engaged in Educational, Medical and Social activities:

EDUCATIONAL : REPORT From April 2017 to March 2018

1. Convent of Mary Immaculate :

➤ PROVIDENCE NURSERY SCHOOL, NAGPUR

During the year Providence Nursery had 70 children. Most of the children are from poor families whose parents work as auto drivers, or are engaged in some private jobs and earn a meager income. While some children come from middle class families whose parents either work in some Government offices or in some business departments.

Sr. Alphonsa is in-charge of the Nursery. She is helped by two teachers and helpers. During this period there was picnic, annual concert, celebrations of Diwali, Christmas, Girl Child Day, and National Days like Independence Day and Republic Day. The poor children are given ample opportunities to grow. They have benefitted much from various activities like speech competition, talent show and sports and drills. Parents were satisfied and happy to see the improvement of their children.

2. KARUNA NIVAS NURSERY MANSAR :

No of students in the academic year 2017-18- 75

Girls : 37 Boys : 38

In our Nursery of Karuna Nivas, we had 75 children who were taught to be disciplined from the very beginning of their education. They were given opportunities to bring forth their talents through various cultural activities. They enjoyed the action songs and rhymes. They began to have a loving attitude towards others and learnt to adjust and help each other. They also were taken for one day's outing.



3. SHISHU VIKAS KENDRA (NURSERY)

This year we had 88 children in our nursery. We teach them to read, write, sing and dance. We conduct some indoor games, sports and celebration of teacher's day, common festivals and children's day. We keep in touch with parents and inform them of the programs of our nursery. Four of us help the teacher in teaching and other activities of the Shishu Vikas Kendra.



4. MARIA BHAVAN, MURTIZAPUR

In our center there are 10 sisters who are involved in different activities like Education, counselling and family visits. Seven sisters are involved in the educational activities. Three are in the high school, two in the primary, and two are in the preprimary Section of the School run by Mary Salian Society.

We visit the homes of students who are weak in their studies. Special counseling is given to the broken families. Poor students are helped financially. After the schooling deserving Girl students are helped by giving them appropriate jobs in the school. Women's day was celebrated with much pomp and show in the primary section. Dr. Sharma was called to guide the women (mothers) on health, hygiene, gynec diseases. She also guided them on how to

take care of the growing girl children. Through tree plantation on various occasions the children are given awareness on environment.

Asha Bhavan Nursing Home had organized a free gynae and pediatric health camp in Nagari Primary Health Centre, Darshan Nagar, Nandanvan on 3rd December 2017.

At 10.00 am camp was inaugurated by lighting a lamp by Dr. Vasihali Changole, Dr. Ravi Bhelonde, Sr. Vanita, Mr. Wagh and Mrs. Dehate.



Gynie doctors namely Dr. Vaishali Changole and Dr. Seema Dande examined 169 Gynie patients. Two Pediatricians – Dr. Ravi Bhelonde and Dr. Girish Charde examined 129 children.

Women's day celebration:



8th March was celebrated in the nursing home to mark the international women's day. Dr. Seema Dande was the chief guest and Dr. Aruna Patil was guest of honor. Dr. Seema Dande spoke on the role of women in the society and importance of women in the family.

Free Mammography camp

Asha Bhavan Nursing home conducted a free Mammography camp in the Nursing home on 21st March 2018. Dr. Rohini along with her team examined the patients and had provided



the facility for all the women. She also gave awareness and explained how they need to take precautions. 65 women benefited from the camp.

Camp in Padrithana:

On 29th March 2018 general health check up was done in Padrithana. It is an interior village where people do not have health facilities. Dr. Bharati along with three GNM nurses – namely Sr. Bhavana, Sr. Joicy and Sr. Sherly and social worker Sr. Vanita attended the patients and provided medicines as well as basic health tips. 96 benefited from the camp.

Session on health and hygiene:

Sister Bhavna emphasized the importance of hygiene in the home. She also gave tips of healthy food habits. Women were interested to know and they also had clarification of their doubts. Many women are addicted to pan and gutka. Sister explained the consequences of addiction.

Joined with likeminded NGO, namely Vishwodaya Multipurpose Social Service Society we run a mobile clinic once a week with a team of Doctors, Nurses and Social Workers in Umri Village, Parshivni Taluka, Nagpur District. Many patients come to the Mobile clinic for their health problems and for guidance.

WELFARE CENTERS :

1. MARIA NIWAS BOARDING 2017 – 2018

As the academic year started at the last week of June 2017, the old and new students from poor families came to stay in the boarding. There were 55 students studying in classes 3rd to 10th. This year 10 students of 10th class appeared for board exams and all of them had good result and they went out for further studies. Among the inmates 18 are sponsored for their studies. Sometimes some donors and well-wishers provide food, study materials and play materials on the occasion of their birthdays or any such event.

Children are well looked after by the boarding in charge Sr. Georgina and two helpers. One teacher comes every evening to mind their studies. Every Saturday brothers from Pilar Niketan comes to give them moral classes and conduct organized games. All the children enjoy and profit from these activities. Celebrations like Diwali and Christmas are organized, and after the celebration children go for holidays. Also September 8th is observed as Boarding Day. It is celebrated with much enthusiasm. On this day children come up with various skills and talents as they present various cultural activities. Delicious food is served for all on this occasion.

Environmental awareness and dignity of labour is given to children by encouraging them for gardening and household work. Maintaining good health and hygiene and good environment is inculcated in them.



2. F.C REPORT OF THE BENEFICIARIES, NAGPUR

The total number of children sponsored are 58 through the associations of “Enfance du monde” France.

There is only one child sponsored under” France Parrainages” France.

Only three children’s names are mentioned in the association of” Rayon de Solleil de l’Enfant Etranger, France.” Their amount is handed over to them. Other amount goes for the maintenance, and education and upkeep of the boarding Maria Niwas , where we have 55 children.

Some of the children are studying in our Providence school and stay in Maria Niwas Boarding. Some children are doing their higher studies in other Schools and Colleges.

All these children are helped for their education, either by cash or with materials, stationaries and boarding fee etc...

These children are from different back-grounds. Many are very poor and can’t afford to study. Single parented children also are there. These associations are rendering a great help to the less privileged children of the society.

There are students who completed their study and got good jobs in different fields. In return some of them help other children for their studies.

The humanitarian services help the under privileged children of our society. Education helps them to become better citizens and they are able to build their homes as cultured families.

One of our girl Sayali whom we helped through our agency, completed her 10th, 12th, and D. Ed remaining with us in Maria Niwas Boarding. Now she is working as a teacher and earn a salary of Rs. 25,000.00 p.m. (Twenty Five Thousand) From her earning she is helping two other girls for their higher studies.



3. MARY IMMACULATE HOSTEL, NAGPUR

In June 2017 as the academic year started some students took admission in the hostel. Mainly students from our D.Ed College. There were some college students from 11th, 12th as well as a few school students. Few students of crash course too were there for short period of 45 days. Though a total of 46 students, all were not at the same time members of the hostel. 4 of them were going to outside colleges. All our hostel students were from poor and middle class families. Some were not able to pay the hostel fee, so they were given concession and few were helped by some benefactors through our sisters.

The hostel has a warden and an assistant warden, two cooks cum house keepers. Students follow the time table, rules and regulations of the hostel and they maintain discipline. From time to time moral classes are given to inculcate in them moral values. The motto of the hostel is to facilitate and promote educational standard and value based life. All common festivals are celebrated by the students such as Diwali and Christmas. Other celebrations are hostel day on Dec. 8th, Manager's day and hostel warden's day. During these occasions students put up cultural program and make the day more enjoyable.

They are not only helped for their education by special attention of sisters but also given input session for character formation, forming them to be responsible Citizens of our Country.



4. HOLY FAMILY CONVENT, UNTKHANA, NAGPUR

We are 18 members in the community. Most of us are involved in the activities of the Home for aged and handicapped, Such as medical, educational, and social.

There are 250 inmates, consisting of Old men, Women, Sheltered boys' girls, and children. Especial preference is given to the children's education and treatment. Many children have undergone corrective surgeries. They are given Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy. We are giving special coaching classes to the weak students. We provide nutritional food to pick up their health. Medical camps and medical investigation are done. We follow up the ex-students and help them for higher studies and possible help is given for their settlement. We find job opportunities for the adult handicapped in consultation with various NGO's.

NAME OF THE PATIENT: Nagesh Babarao Khobragade

Aged 24 years.

FATHERS NAME : Babarao Khobragade

MOTHERS NAME: Sushila Babarao Khobragade



Family History: Sushila Babarao Khobragade's parents were residents of Home for aged and Handicapped. Kissan Harie Gunmode was Handicapped and not able to care for the children. When Sushila was 2 years old they came to Nagpur and took shelter in our Home. They were admitted in our Oldage Home and both died of old age . Sushila was married to Babarao Khobragade. Babarao Khobragade died in the year2001,She has a son Nagesh who is sick. She is a widow having no relatives to take care of Nagaesh. They are now living as inmates of Home for Aged and Handicapped. We do our best to treat the Young Man who is the only hope of the widowed Mother.

Medical History of Nagesh. Nagesh is suffering from segment narrowing in distal penile urethra with contrast column passing possibly focal strictures and urethritis for which he underwent urethral stricture operation on 31/5/2017 at Super Hospital Medical College Nagpur. He was admitted for 3 weeks. As he was below poverty line his operation was free at Super Hospital. Other expenses are met by the Home. He is also suffering from sickle cell disease, repeatedly hepatitis. Prostatomegaly, cystitis, mild splenomegaly, dilated portal vein. He shows very slow improvement due to above complications. He is in need of proper treatment and care. Now we are treating him under the direction of Dr.Suhas V.Salpekar Urologist at Vasant Nursing Home Shivaji Nagar Nagpur. He is being treated at the Home for Aged and Handicapped.

5. VISHWODAYA, NAGPUR :

The sisters are involved in various programmes for the welfare of women, children and families of the down trodden. Sisters visit the nearby slums; Khushi Nagar, Nara, Nari, Martin Nagar and near by areas. They listen to the problems of women and try to help them by counselling and sometimes help them materially especially families that struggle to meet both the ends meat. They guide them to face the challenges of drunken husbands. They guide them to approach an NGO dealing with de addiction and rehabilitate them.

Sisters visit the homes of people living with HIV (PL HA) especially widows and their children. The visit of the sisters encourages them to live with hope and courage since most of the women live hiding as their families do not accept them. The sisters counsel them and make them feel that there is someone interested in them and care for them.

Animation and formation of Self Help Groups: Sisters organize motivational seminars for women who are interested in forming self help groups and help them to form, animate and run their groups. At the same time they inculcate in them a sense of belonging to the group, train them in leadership, skills in maintaining accounts and records of the group, get involved in the community for its development. They become aware of the problems faced by the people and find solutions as a group. Sisters aim at building healthy homes and communities by building rapport with the people and encouraging people to live in harmony.

6. ASHA KIRAN, PANED, PEN

We are working in Pen and Khalapur Talukas in Raigad District of Maharashtra. We are eight sisters in the community. We are involved in Social, and Educational activities.

Areas of work: Women empowerment

We have 25 Self Help Groups in 12 villages. 465 women are involved in Self Help Groups (SHGs) in Bank savings. Through the SHGs we are making them aware of Govt. schemes and make use of it for Income generating. They are becoming more confident and are able to handle their Wadi (Village) issues by themselves such as ration, water problem, and Govt. schemes. They are able to approach the concerned departmental Officers for settling their

problems such as Sarpanch, Gramsevaks, Thalaties, Tahasildar, Food Officer, Tribal Development Officers, Block Development Officers, Banks, and to follow up of their applications. SHGs are motivated and do the regular savings, some of the SHGs have taken mid-day meal cooking in their villages, goat rearing and vegetable cultivation etc...
